# **Body language**

 A TED Talk entitled <u>Your body language may shape who you are</u>, This includes the idea of 'Fake it until you make it' aka 'Fake it until you become it' - i.e. that simply adopting a posture (e.g. a power pose) or role will create a physiological change. Has a graphic describing what contributes to a positive presence. Those attributes are confidence, passion, enthusiasm, engagement, comfort, and authenticity.
